Dear Friends of First Presbyterian,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ (Phil 1:2). As I write this letter, my heart overflows with the joy I have experienced serving as your MOTA Director during the last school year.

Members of our church have donated \$5,438.00 toward our summer mission trip in June. I am completely overwhelmed by your generosity, and I sincerely thank God for each of you. Our mission team will be traveling to Chimaltenango, Guatemala on a medical mission from June 22-June 29. Dr. Jerry Meyer, Pastor Renee Meyer, MOTA student Sarah Locke, and I will be traveling with Jenna Goggins, the pastor of First Presbyterian of Paducah and her co-leader from Vermont, Jennifer DeMauro. Jennifer, a friend of Jenna's, is an elder in the Presbyterian Church who has worked with poverty relief in Guatemala for twenty-five years.

We are staying in a secure, gated college dormitory and working with Grace English School for the trip. This nonprofit school was established by an American couple after their child, Grace, passed away. Bill Minihan, the founder, owns the Badgett Playhouse Theater in Grand Rivers, and his students at Grace School are already pairing with Spanish classes in Western Kentucky high schools through Skype to improve their English language skills.

The school is managed by Logan Sierra, who was reared in a group home in Guatemala after his parents died. He was eventually adopted by an American couple and educated in the U.S., but he returned to Guatemala to educate disadvantaged children. Besides offering classes, the school also offers a free after-school program to help children learn to speak English, a skill that will make them more employable as they get older.

The school also employs Reynaldo Juarez Aju, Ph.D., a graduate of the National Conservatory of Music. He is the music teacher at the private school and offers local children free music lessons in drums, violin, guitar, ukulele, piano, and trumpet. I knew that our congregation would love hearing about this ministry since we all love music so much.

Because of his own life experiences, Logan has a special place in his heart for underprivileged children. He is going to take our team to several different places that work with the neediest children in the area. For example, we are visiting one of the poorest rural areas to assist with a feeding program. Your donations will supply the food for the families the day we visit. Another facility helps special needs children, some of the most underserved populations. A third site helps abandoned and abused girls. We will be donating shoes, vitamins, and Children's Tylenol in each of these locations. We will also conduct Bible Schools for these young people and for those who accompany their parents to the clinics.

Jerry will be seeing patients in temporary clinics while Sarah Locke, RN, assists him. Jennifer DuMauer has set up these clinics for years. She works with an international nonprofit organization to arrange details and purchase prescription medications such as antibiotics for mission teams. Renee and I will be helping at the clinics as needed, but our focus will be on the Bible Schools.

As a college student, I agonized over whether I wanted to teach English and history or go into full-time ministry. I even contemplated becoming a missionary. As many of you know, I

left teaching for a while almost twenty-five years ago and worked for First Methodist Church. Who could have guessed that at this point in my life, God would grant me the chance to work in both areas? I am so thankful that you have given me the opportunity to live out my calling. We have some extraordinary young people coming into our fellowship through MOTA. They are bright, talented students who are truly devoting their lives to the service of others. Your love and support are enriching their lives, and through them, you minister to the church yet to come.

As I close, I'd like to quote from Philippians 1:3-11, for it expresses my thoughts perfectly:

"I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me....And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight to help you to determine what is best, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God."

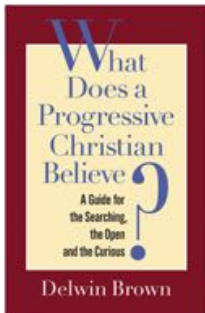
